



Mount Auburn Preparatory Academy (MAPA) serves EK-12 students in Cincinnati with a well-rounded education that equips them with the 21st century knowledge and skills they need to prepare for a lifetime of learning. The campus features two playgrounds, a gymnasium, and a media room. Separate floors are dedicated to

upper and lower grade levels. Small class sizes, expansive student and family support services, and a wide range of extracurricular and sports opportunities provide the basis for student success.

MAPA supports the educational and career aspirations of students as they progress through school. Students can participate in College Credit Plus beginning in Grade 7—a dual enrollment program where students earn college credit as they work toward high school graduation. MAPA launched a new Career Based Intervention (CBI) program this year which helps students identify potential career paths and begin building career-specific skills and knowledge.

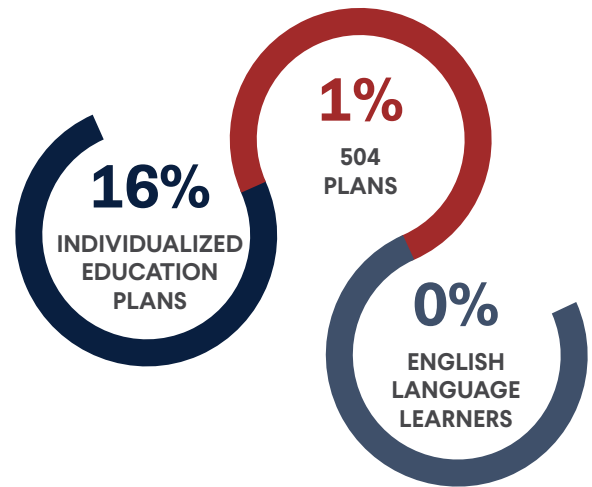

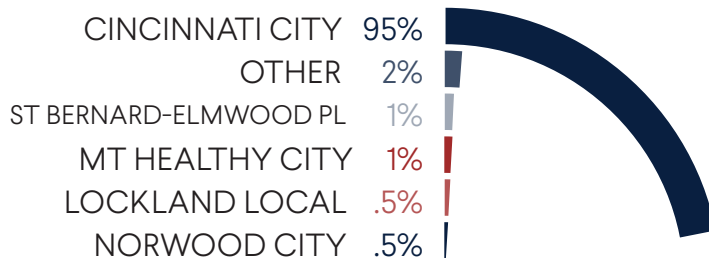

- Graduated 100% of the Class of 2023

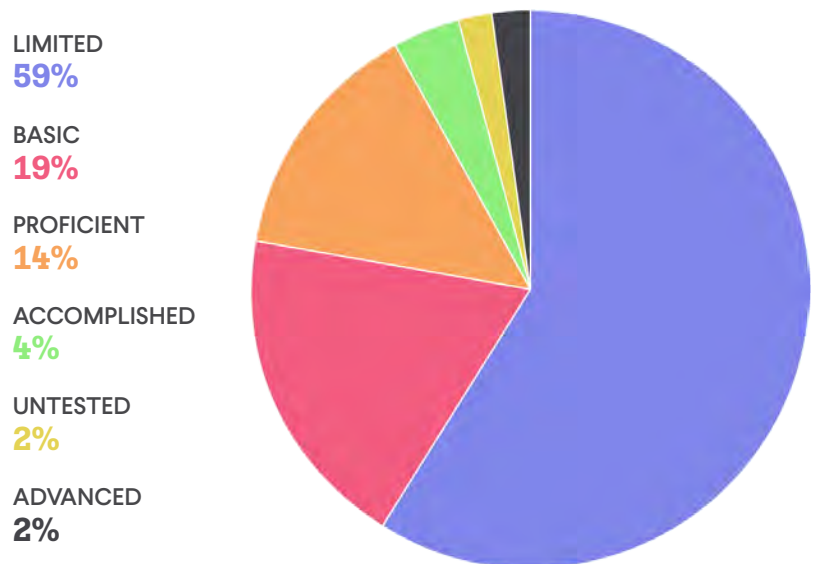
ACADEMIC PROGRESS

The academic goals of Mount Auburn Preparatory Academy during the 2022-2023 school year were to:

- Increase student achievement in English Language Arts by raising the raw performance index of 2020-2022 of 46.9 (51.2 of a possible 109.1) by 13.1 points according to the Ohio State Tests for grades 3-8 along with the English II End of Course exams by June 30, 2023.
- Increase student achievement in math by raising the raw performance index of 2020-2023 of 46.9 (51.2 of a possible 109.1) by 13.1 points according to the Ohio State Tests for grades 3-8 along with the Algebra I, Geometry and Integrated Math I End of Course exams by June 30, 2023.

Mount Auburn Preparatory Academy's progress towards academic goals was mixed. The performance index in ELA increased to 57.65, but Math decreased to 35.32.

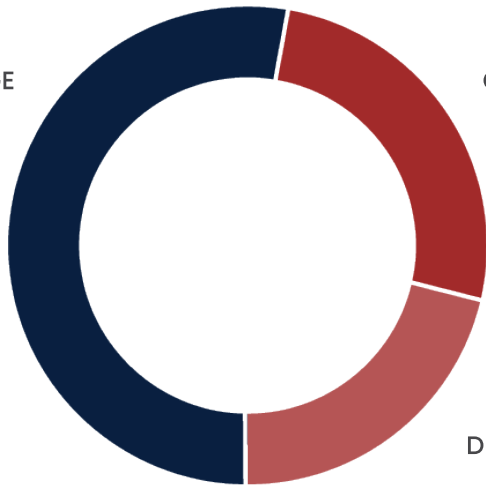
CLASS OF 2023



The Class of 2023 was made up of nineteen seniors. 100% graduated with 78% planning to enroll in college or university. Seniors earned \$840,000 in scholarships (an average of \$44k per student). All together, seniors were accepted to a total of 26 two-year and 42 four-year colleges and universities, including 14 Historically Black Colleges and Universities.
